

Transition Timeline and Milestones

2018

• November: City Council unanimously votes to establish municipal police service

2020

- February: Province of BC approves Surrey's policing transition
- June: Civilian Surrey Police Board established by Province of BC
- August: Board creates Surrey Police Service (SPS)
- November: First Chief Constable, Norm Lipinski, selected by Board

2021

- January/February: First three Deputy Chief Constables hired: Jennifer Hyland, Mike LeSage, Todd Matsumoto
- March: SPS begins recruiting and hiring sworn and civilian staff
- March: Agreement signed for CUPE 402 to represent civilian employees
- May: SPS crest, vision and values revealed
- June: SPS launches community consultation
- July: First swearing-in ceremony held for SPS police officers
- August: Surrey Police Union certified to represent SPS police officers
- September: SPS surpasses100 staff hired
- November: Operational deployment of first group of SPS officers

2022

- February: First SPS Strategic Plan released
- March: Collective Bargaining Agreement reached with Surrey Police Union
- April: First class of recruits begins with SPS
- August: SPS becomes second largest municipal police agency in BC
- November: Surrey Police Inspectors' Association is established
- November: New City Council votes to retain the RCMP and cancel the transition to SPS

2023

- January: SPS surpasses 200 officers deployed into policing operations
- March: First SPS recruit class graduates from the JIBC
- July: Province of BC denies Surrey Council's request to retain the RCMP
- October: The <u>Police Amendment Act, 2023</u> is passed into law, requiring Surrey to be policed by SPS
- **November:** Province suspends appointments of Surrey Police Board members and appoints temporary Board Administrator to advance policing transition



2024

- **April:** Province sets November 29, 2024 as the date for SPS to become the police of jurisdiction for the City of Surrey
- July: Province and City of Surrey announce an agreement has been reached to complete the transition from RCMP to SPS.
- July-September: First 30 SPS-branded police vehicles are deployed in Surrey.
- September: Over 50% of required number of SPS police officers have been hired.
- November: Surrey Police Service becomes the police of jurisdiction.
- **November:** The Province of BC and RCMP establish the RCMP Surrey Policing Operations Support Unit to support policing in Surrey until SPS is established as a standalone agency and the policing transition is fully completed.
